

"Admiral David G. Farragut"

David Glasgow Farragut served in the United States Navy for 60 years, first seeing service in the War of 1812. Orphaned before he turned seven, he was adopted by Commodore David Porter, and received a midshipman's commission before he turned 10. In addition to fighting pirates in the Caribbean and serving in the Mexican War, Farragut oversaw the construction of the Mare Island Navy Yard in California. Appointed to command the Gulf Blockading Squadron in 1862, he ran the Confederate forts on the lower Mississippi to capture New Orleans, and later ran the batteries at Vicksburg. He went on to see action at Port Hudson and gained lasting glory at Mobile Bay. In late December 1864, President Abraham Lincoln promoted Farragut to vice admiral, the senior ranking officer in the Navy.

November 15, 1864 - General William Tecumseh Sherman's armies departed Atlanta, Georgia for his 36day march to the sea.

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A Moving Experience. A Historical Marker Dedication for an Exceptional Civil War Family.

Rufus and Mary Gates Dawes

On August 3rd I was privileged to participate in the dedication of a historical marker honoring Rufus and Mary Dawes in Marietta, Ohio. The marker has been placed in front of the home they shared for almost thirty years, at 508 Fourth Street. Here they raised six children. The four sons became prominent national business and political leaders. The two daughters preserved the remarkable family documents that inspired me to write and publish a book about Brevet Brigadier General Rufus Dawes of the Sixth Wisconsin Volunteers and the famed Iron Brigade, and the exceptional wartime sweetheart, bride, mother, grandmother – Mary Beman Gates Dawes. Rufus and Mary were both leading citizens of the historic Marietta community located on the Ohio River.

It was a great day! I highly recommend a visit and stay.

Many know that in the course of book research I happened to meet a great-granddaughter of Rufus and Mary in a serendipitous Marietta restaurant encounter. Barb Moberg and husband Jack have become close friends. Barb arranged a Dawes family reunion in Marietta to coincide with the marker dedication, and over forty family members from various locations attended. It was a treat to meet them. The ceremony was held at the historic First Congregational Church on Front Street, where pre-Civil War Rufus became infatuated with Mary while he was a student at Marietta College. Wonderful friends with the Mid-Ohio Valley Civil War Round Table, including master of ceremonies Mr. Leight Murray, organized the event. This is the MOV-CWRT's sixth historical marker sponsorship and installation! Perhaps an example of what our own CWRT should consider doing for any number of prominent Indianapolis Civil War figures.



Presentation of colors was performed by three members of the Milwaukee CWRT-Iron Brigade Association, several Sons of Union Veterans, and past Indy speaker Phil Spaugy, representing the 19th Indiana. All wore their period uniforms on a warm day in the un-airconditioned church! A family member and expert bagpipe player in Scottish dress escorted the colors. Scott Britton (past ICWRT Speaker) and I related the life stories of Rufus and Mary before Barb and several 3x-great grandchildren unveiled the two-sided marker. I had been honored to draft the verbiage, refined by edits from Scott and Barb.



Jenny Thompson

Indianapolis Civil War Roundtable member and former HARDTACK editor Jenny Thompson passed away on October 30. Married for 44 years to roundtable member Jerry Thompson, she was the mother of Jeremy Thompson and Rose Loppe, and the grandmother of five. She attended Open Door Baptist Church, where she was married.


Jenny received her B.A. from IN University in 2002 and an M.A. with honors in Civil War Studies in 2006. She was an adjunct professor at American Military University. In addition to the ICWRT, she was a member of the Indiana Historical Society, the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War. She was a published author and had written a four-volume study of the 8th Indiana Infantry Regiment. In addition to her interest in the Civil War, Jenny enjoyed crafts.

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Book Review

Decade of Disunion. Robert W. Merry. Simon & Schuster. 2024.

The staff at the Indiana Historical Society asked Tony Roscetti to review a new book, "Decade of Disunion" by Robert W. Merry. Since Tony is busy and still gainfully employed he asked me if I would do it. Here goes.

This book is one of the best analyses of how fire eaters from South Carolina and radical abolitionists from Massachusetts led the way to a horrific war that claimed the lives of over 750,000 Americans. Merry is a wonderful writer and his clear-headed descriptions of events like the publication of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," the caning of Charles Sumner on the floor of the Senate, John Brown's ill conceived, homicidal actions at Osawatomie and Harpers Ferry served to inflame moderates in both the North and the South.

Those events also illuminated how differently each side viewed each other and themselves.

Merry explores the origins of South Carolina's culture which, unlike any other state, it was settled by slave owners from Barbados, probably the most brutal slavocracy in the world. Massachusetts was settled by moralistic Puritans who reveled in controlling and reforming the actions of others whose behaviors they found reprehensible. It was a recipe for disaster.

Merry also emphasizes the enormity of the loss of Clay, Webster, and Calhoun in a short period of time, which deprived the country of essential leadership that had helped bind the country together for almost half of its existence.

This book is a must read for anyone who wants a better understanding of how the U.S. stumbled into the disaster we puckishly call the "Civil War."
